FROM THE RABBI

Happy December everyone,

After returning from the JNF International Conference in Dallas, I feel energized to have met and celebrated Shabbat with so many proud Zionists. In rubbing shoulders with rabbis from all over the country and religious spectrum, we shared stories from the last year. JNF has evolved well beyond a tree-planting organization. We learned about the Jewish National Fund's pledge to help rebuild Israel's devasted North, as well as the Southern Kibbutzim along the Gaza Border Region. I was pleased to see that some of my favorite programs were still going strong. In particular, one organization in which I happened to visit during my JNF Future's Mission to Israel in 2021, Soldiers in Uniform, was highlighted as an organization dedicated to the integration of special-needs soldiers into the IDF. Throughout the week, I was immensely impressed with the passion, knowledge, and conviction that folks demonstrated. In my travels, I met many exciting and emerging leaders, both male and female, Jewish and even gentile, but one demographic seemed to be lacking; younger non-Orthodox Jewish men.

In my conversations with both fellow rabbis as well as lay-leaders, many were still trying to make heads and tails of the post-election analysis. In the kvetching and celebrating around the losses and victories, we all seemed to agree that while women had been encouraged to find their philanthropic voice, their charitable projects, and help innovate Jewish ritual and communal life from the bimah to the board room, younger men have noticeably either been left behind or have actively left Jewish circles. Now, many men and women exist in higher positions of Jewish leadership, but there are a lot less men involved on the ground level in Jewish institutions. If young men aren't interested in summer camps, bar mitzvahs, Hillel, Israel, and synagogue life, then it doesn't bode well for the future of progressive American Jewish life. We seem to be at a tipping point where young men just aren't interested in Jewish life or Jewish causes, and maybe we need to figure out why?

The current trend of men disinterest in Judaism is in line with larger more general cultural, societal, and universal trends for men aged 18-45; dissatisfied with their lives, many in this group have opted out of organized communities. Some men view the rise of women on the socio-economic ladder as coming at the expense of men's happiness and fulfillment in life. Sadly, rather than search outward for answers, resources, and a support network, many men aimlessly look inward to drugs, alcohol, and all too often, social media and the internet, which can be a dangerous echo-chamber of unregulated grievance and pity. Social clubs, organizations, and dare I say houses of worship used to be fabulous places to meet, learn, socialize, find references and resources to help solve problems, and build community; experiencing a living, breathing conversation in real time. Young men had institutions like the VFM, Lion's Club, Rotary, Elks, Masons, Kiwanis, etc. Now men flock to Redditt, Qanon, UFC, and Draft Kings.

Yes, Judaism requires one to think, feel, have an opinion, take a moral stance, and live by it. If for some reason, Judaism, Jewish institutions, and synagogue life are perceived as too emotional, psychological, feminine, or simply demanding by asking too much of young men, then perhaps we need to reach out and appeal to younger men. Judaism has been a vital source of life and answers to life's most challenging questions. Jewish institutions are a fantastic place to grow one's perspective, feed one's belly & soul, and even meet a loving-partner, or life-long friend, but they require investing in

something greater than one's self. If we're entering a new era of quid-pro quo bro morality, let us be blunt about what it takes to build a mutually beneficial community; BUY-IN.

So, in the next few months, I am going to make an extra effort to reach out to the younger men in our community and on the periphery of our Jewish community. I want to hear from you; what are you interested in, how do you feel about Judaism, Jewish life, and what is your relationship with our community? As we enter the Chanukkah festival, this is a critical time of the year and a wonderful opportunity to invite folks back into our community. Nobody should be alone during this season, and let us strive to make sure nobody amongst us feels alone.

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From the President

What does it mean to be a part of a community? I was interested in the background of the word, both in English and in Hebrew (kehilla). According to the New World Encyclopedia, the word community "is derived from the Latin communitas (meaning the same), which is in turn derived from communis, which means "common, public, shared by all or many." Communis comes from a combination of the Latin prefix con- (which means "together") and the word munis (which has to do with performing services)."

To me, the Hebrew Kehillah seems to imply an action: gather. Whereas the English is about shared norms, or we can infer, experiences. Put together, the origins seem to inspire: Come together! There are even "rules" around needing community in order to fulfill certain mitzvot. For instance, there are some prayers that "require" a minyan, a group of 10 people, to be recited (Note: I said people and not men, because in the Reform movement all adults are counted). The idea comes from the Talmud and Hebrew word minyan comes from the word maneh meaning to count or to number.

We need one another! On our first day of Religious School this year, we discussed what we need to make a Jewish community. And our students rightly stated: we need the people. Jewish community can happen anytime, anywhere, with a Torah or without, but it can't happen without the people, the community, the act of individuals coming together to be a collective ONE.

I would like this coming year's theme is exploring ONE: one Temple Beth Israel, one Jewish country, one Jewish language, one God. During this time of year filled with holidays and a lot of opportunities for togetherness, I hope we can find our commonalities and shared experiences inspiring rather than divisive. That we can feel our personal link in the chain of tradition and that we are part of something bigger than ourselves. Our TBI community is stronger because of each one of our individuals, learning and growing together! Wishing you a Happy Hanukkah!

WE HEARD YOU A NEW WINTER SHABBAT SCHEDULE

Many of you have asked... and your TBI Ritual Committee has listened. We are going to experiment with our Shabbat service schedule this winter and we hope the changes will make it easier for you to join us for services in person.

What have we heard? Many members don't feel comfortable driving to and from services in the dark and getting home so late on Friday nights. You also may have seen frequent requests for volunteers to host upcoming onegs from Steve Cahill, our oneg Shabbat and Kiddush Coordinator. Steve has noticed that during the winter, members are happy to host a Kiddush following our Saturday morning services but seem to be reluctant to host onegs that require us to stay even later on a Friday night.

What have we done in response? Starting in January and running through March, we are going to switch one additional Friday night service to Saturday morning.

Here is our updated Saturday morning Shabbat service schedule, all beginning at 10am:
January 4th and January 18th
February 8th (celebrating the Bat Mitzvah of Bella Seigler) and February 22nd
March 8th and March 22nd

Note: There will be no Friday services before these Saturday dates. The remaining regular Friday night services will still begin at 7pm, with event and holiday-based Family services centered around a meal such as Hanukkah, Souper Shabbat and our Passover Seder beginning at 5:30pm as in the past.

Please check the January, February and March calendars in the appropriate bulletin and be on the lookout for the upcoming invitation from Steve Cahill seeking Oneg Shabbat volunteers.

We hope these changes will enable more of our members and friends to celebrate Shabbats together during the coming winter months. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact Rabbi Joslin or Andy Kaplan.

The **Rodney/Sarah Brown** Family spent time together with their daughters and significant others at a family wedding in Pennsylvania. Time together with our entire families is so precious.


